Welcome to Deptford Literature Festival, a celebration of the diversity and creativity of Deptford and Lewisham. Come along to discover local organisations and talent, meet authors and editors, and try out your writing skills. Deptford Literature Festival is for anyone who wants to have a go.

Taking place over four days, from Thursday 27 March to Sunday 30 March, the festival launches with Lewisham Lyricists curated by Emma Warren on Friday 28 March.

Throughout the weekend you can enjoy workshops, talks, walking tours, zine and book making, readings, performances and much more. We also have a special event for our *Lewisham, Borough of Literature* campaign. Come and hear new work created by our commissioned authors, meet the advisory group and have your say.

We have a special programme of family and children's activities for younger festival-goers and creative workshops for teenagers. There are also many ways to get involved from home. All sessions are open to writers with different levels of experience – from complete beginners to regular writers.

The Festival Anthology and Young Writers Collective Anthology will be available for free at the festival hub in Deptford Lounge. Pick them up to read new writing from local, emerging and established writers and our collective of 25 young poets. Visit the festival exhibition to discover stories by elders from Entelechy Arts and Meet Me at the Albany that celebrate our local community.

Deptford Literature Festival is run by Spread the Word with creative producer Tom MacAndrew and funded by Arts Council England with support from the Albany, Deptford Lounge and Lewisham Libraries.

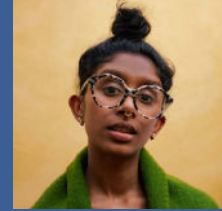
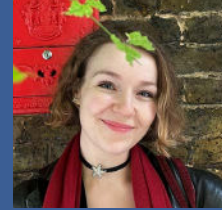
Festival Audio Walk – Sky Breaks by Amber Obasi + 鯿桐 (Aí Tung)

What is the point of breaks? What happens when we look at the sky, the streets, passers-by? What transformations can be ushered in through daydreams?

Sky Breaks is an audio walk based on writing produced by Amber Obasi and 鯿桐 (Aí Tung) in collaboration with Deptford residents. It explores these questions, and uses benches, bus-stops, low walls, and other public seating areas across Deptford to consider the power of public breaks. Not just as single moments of time, but as interconnected processes in the creation of change.

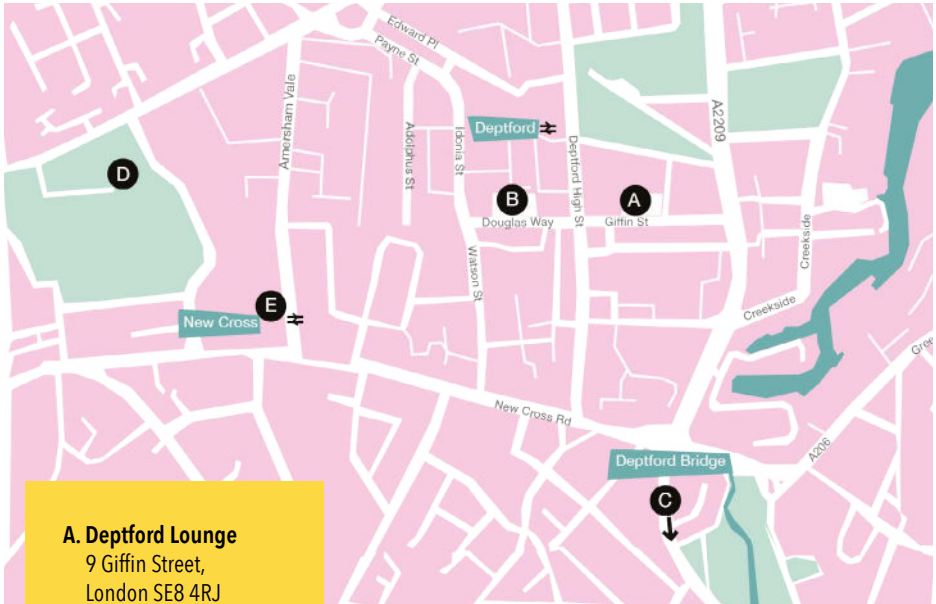
